


BEHIND NOTRE-DAME'S MONUMENTAL RESTORATION, 2025 PAUL MELLON LECTURE

A Free Event Co-Presented by the Cathedral of St. John the Divine, World Monuments Fund, and The Columbia University Maison Française

> Featuring Philippe Villeneuve, Chief Architect, Notre-Dame Restoration Project

New York—February 4, 2025: <u>World Monuments Fund (WMF)</u> today announces the 2025 Paul Mellon Lecture, highlighting the extraordinary project to restore Notre-Dame de Paris, France, after the cathedral's devastating fire in April 2019. Co-presented by the Columbia University Maison Française, the lecture will be delivered by **Philippe Villeneuve**, chief architect of the restoration of Notre-Dame, who will offer deep insights into the five-year process. The event will take place on **March 12, 2025**, at the historic **Cathedral of St. John the Divine** in New York City as a part of WMF's 60th anniversary public events.

Philippe Villeneuve will be joined by **Barry Bergdoll**, Meyer Schapiro Professor of Art History and Archaeology at Columbia University; **Bas Smets**, landscape architect and winner of the

2021 international design competition to reimagine Notre-Dame's surroundings; **Patrick Malloy**, dean of the Cathedral of St. John the Divine; and **Bénédicte de Montlaur**, president and CEO of WMF. Together, they will provide a behind-the-scenes look at the challenges of restoring one of the world's most treasured landmarks and highlight the innovative approaches and collaborative efforts that are shaping the future of cultural heritage preservation.

The Paul Mellon Lecture series was inaugurated in 2003 and is supported by the Paul Mellon Education Fund at WMF. This annual lecture enables audiences to learn about critical issues in the field of cultural heritage. Past speakers have included Kent Weeks on the challenges of tourism management in the Valley of the Kings, Egypt; Charles Dempsey on the history of the Carracci Gallery at the Palazzo Farnese, Italy; Anna Somers Cox on the impact of ever-increasing tourism on Venice; and Iwan Baan on his personal photographic style.

This lecture is part of a nationwide tour led by World Monuments Fund, with further events at the Legion of Honor in San Francisco on March 8, 2025, and the Society of the Four Arts in Palm Beach on March 10, 2025. Each lecture features Philippe Villeneuve, Barry Bergdoll, and Bénédicte de Montlaur, along with special guests, each offering insights into the complexities of preserving cultural heritage, fire prevention, and the innovative conservation approaches shaping its future.
